Joseph's Rise to Power

Genesis 39:20 – 41:57 (selected verses)

Major Segments:

- Butler & Baker join Joseph in jail
- Joseph interprets their dreams
- Good news for Butler; bad news for bake
- Pharaoh also has dreams and calls for Joseph to interpret
- Joseph predicts 7 years of harvest and 7 years of famine
- Pharaoh decides Joseph is the one to lead through those times

Segment Questions:

- The king's cupbearer and baker offended him, which resulted in them being thrown into prison with Joseph. What do you learn about Joseph from the way he responded to them in prison?
- The rest of the chapter tells of their dreams, Joseph's interpretation of the dreams, and how the interpretations were later fulfilled. In Genesis 40:14-15 and 20-23, how was life once again "unfair" to Joseph?
- Why did Pharaoh place Joseph in charge of Egypt (41:38-45)?
- How old was Joseph at this point (41:46)?

Action Questions:

- How can you keep a proper perspective when you have been "wronged" by others and
 you are paying the unjustified consequences? Can you remember a specific time or
 situation in your life like this that you could share? What was the end result? Would you
 now handle a similar situation differently?
- Who are some other people in the Bible who had "delays" in their lives?
- There is no mistake in where God has you. Allow him to use you where you are:
 - If you are, are you allowing God to use you right where you are?
 - How do you see God's hand in the "delays" in your life?
 - How is God polishing you?

Life in prison was hard for Joseph, but God was with him and blessed him. His jailor came to respect him and finally started to use him as an assistant. Eventually Joseph was in charge of the entire prison.
