Genesis 31: (story compiled from selected verses)

Major Segments:

- The reasons for leaving
- Laban's dream and his meeting with Jacob
- A) God's protection
 - B) Laban's idol
- Jacob's work history and Jacob's declaration of God's vindication.

Segment Questions:

- What were some of the circumstances leading up to Jacob's leaving? What was the main reason he left? Laban's dream is a major part of this chapter....why? Wouldn't you think this dream would have an impact on Laban? Really, wouldn't you think the whole encounter of Jacob in his life make a difference in the life of Laban?
- Jacob said he rushed away because he was afraid. Should he have been? Was is fear transferred to his wives? (next question)
- Most scholars say the idol was for advice, protection, and/or possession of the idol played an
 important role on who would control the inheritance......why do you think she stole it? Was she
 showing a lack of trust in God?
- Jacob tells of his time working for Laban and all he did for Laban. Is there bitterness there? Jacob tells Laban God vindicated him last night when God appeared to Laban. Why does this seem so important to Jacob?

Action Questions:

- Jacob, left when God told him it was time. How do we make decisions on when to leave or stay in a
 job, a city, an uncomfortable circumstance?
- God told Jacob "I will be with you." But he left in the middle of the night because he was afraid. Can we relate? Why do we sometimes act like we don't believe God is with us? Do we need our extra "idols" to give us assurance?
- Jacob seemed to work beyond the call of the job description. Do we give more than expected from us? Are we OK when we are not recognized for all we do? Do we want vindication?
- Jacob's actions had to impact his relatives for good. They had to see God in his life. How about us, do our non-believing relatives see God in our lives? Are we making a difference to them?

Laban's sons were grumbling that "Jacob has robbed our father!" Jacob was gaining wealth at the expense of Laban. Jacob noticed a considerable cooling in Laban's attitude towards him. The Lord said to Jacob, "Return to the land of your father and grandfather and to your relatives there and I will be with you." This was fine with Jacob's wives as they had felt betrayed by their father and recognized how he had mistreated Jacob and that God was with Jacob.

So without telling Laban, Jacob took all that he had, and started driving his herds toward Canaan. Before they left, Rachel stole her father's family idol.

If you find it, let that person die. "He didn't know that Rachel had taken it. He said if you find anything that belongs to you, I swear before all these relatives of ours I will give it back.

Laban searched the tents belonging to Jacob, Leah, and the two maidservants. He then went into Rachel's tent. She was sitting on her camel seat, where she had put the idol.
