Job's Three Friends

Job 1:1 – 42:17 (*selected verses*)

Major Segments:

- Satan challenges the Lord to take away Job's possessions
- Satan takes all of Job's possessions and causes him great physical and mental pain
- Job stands strong in his trust with the Lord but encounters great confusion about life & God
- Job's friends seek him out to provide insight but place blame on Job and speak untrue of the Lord

Segment Questions:

- Why do you think God was willing to grant permission to Satan to take away Job's valuable possessions?
- Does suffering sometimes have beneficial results on a person's life? What benefits did Job gain/learn through his suffering?
- Why was it that Job's 3 friend's believed Job must have been a sinner to suffer such tragedy in his life?
- God later spoke and rebuked Job for some of his earlier interpretations of why these bad things were happening; he also sternly rebuked the 3 friends for not speaking what is right about God; what lessons did Job and the 3 friends all learn through this encounter?
- In the end, why do you think God blessed Job more in his latter life than before all of the tragedy set in?
- Is it clear as to what Satan learned from God and his followers? Is Satan still pursuing this goal of proving God wrong or is he strictly tempting us to sin?

Action Questions:

- What are some of the ways we can stand strong in our faith and trust God when we encounter severely difficult times?
- Do you have friends that speak untrue about life and God? How do you stand strong in what's right and what's wrong?
- What help can we provide to those suffering through tragedy that need the light of God?

Job was a great man of high integrity who feared God and stayed away from evil. He had seven sons and three daughters. He was a rich man with many servants. His livestock included a large number of sheep, camels, oxen, and donkeys.
