Jonathan's Victory

1 Samuel 13-14

Segment:

- Jonathan, without telling his father Saul, hatches a plan to attack a small outpost of the Philistines. He does so after assuming God's blessing. He slays 20 men with the help of one man, his armor-bearer.
- Saul hears of the slaying and understands the Philistines are in flux. He decides to pursue them and slay them while the getting is good. He presses his army to fight without rest or food until they are vanquished.
- Jonathan eats some honey not knowing Saul cursed anyone who ate. Saul says he must die. Saul's men rebuff Saul's decision and attest to Jonathan's actions being a sign God was in favor of him and the people by virtue of the victory.

Segment Questions:

- Why do you think Jonathan decided, by himself, to concoct this plan? What was the risk?
- What was the result and impact of his harrowing decision to test the Philistines in this way? Could it have backfired?
- What do you think went through Saul's mind when he understood the Philistines' condition? Would he have been excited or scared?
- If you had been the one to eat honey, find out about the curse, and know you could die, what would your reaction have been?
- Do you think both Jonathan and Saul were quick to be relieved when Saul's men came to Jonathan's defense?

Action Questions:

- Is there a time you ventured out on your own and made a decision without first asking for wise counsel? Could it have affected your family in a negative way?
- Have you ever found out after the fact that one of your actions was against the law, or very hurtful to a situation? Did you deny it, hide it, or come clean and try to fix it?
- Has anyone every come to your aid, vouched for you, or pleaded for mercy on your behalf?
